What will YOU do to make sure you have time in your hectic schedule for yourself?


#5 Be genuine (and maybe a little audacious).

Take time to reflect on what you know is important for you.



Painting with Purpose

THOMAS SCHALLER WORKSHOP REVIEW BY KAREN ROBINETTE

Thomas Schaller is a master watercolor painter specializing in urban landscapes. As an instructor, he imparts basic painting practices to his students, including defining a clear focal point, edge control, atmospheric perspective, and judicious cropping and editing of reference material. Because of his background in architecture, he instructs students in the use of one, two,



and three-point perspective. He also demonstrates using value sketches and compositions as road maps for paintings.

The mechanics of painting are very important and regardless of painting style or medium, well-planned designs are the basis for every successful painting. With many years of practice, artists can develop a type of

"muscle memory" where the basics become more of an inherent action – a natural rather than belabored exercise.

Recently Thomas Schaller has discovered a new dimension that adds depth to his painting process – namely painting with intent. When artists have become somewhat proficient with basic skills, they need to go beyond the mechanics of rendering subjects well – and strive to use those abilities to reach higher levels of expression. Artists need to ask themselves why they have chosen to paint a particular subject in a certain way – and what type of response they are trying to elicit from the viewer. When someone starts asking themselves those questions, painting becomes a more complex endeavor.


Clearly defining intent, and painting with skill combined with emotion are worthy goals for visual artists. Thomas Schaller has challenged his students to aim toward that purpose.

Artists submitted a prerecorded video for the Zoom general meeting, but... there is always a but... could we have artists paint live from their studio in a webinar? Our president Molly Murrah calmly said, "Webinars?" (inside she was screaming, "You want me to do what? Webinars?") But she went into fast-track mode to learn about webinars.

Next, rehearsals were set-up with lighting, with cameras over a painting table, and computers focused on the artist, so they could switch back and forth between themselves and the table. Easy as pie. By September

AN EVENING WITH CARLA O'CONNOR

Dave Dunn, Dolores Marquez and I had a great opportunity to visit Carla O'Connor in her studio to record her demonstration for the September NWWS general meeting. Carla's studio is amazing! A large worktable flanked by flat files stands in the center of a beautiful space with clearstory lighting and windows looking out to the woods beyond. The walls are covered with framed masterpieces we could easily have spent the entire time

studying.

This was our first time filming a demonstration in an artists' studio. Dolores did a great job of interviewing Carla and keeping her busy, while Dave and I climbed on top of flat files and ladders to get the lights, cameras and mics set up. We recorded everything with duplicate cameras and smart phones from different angles just to make sure we would have backup videos if needed. We found the phones had

remarkable quality both for images and audio.

Fortunately, Carla was perfectly at ease in her studio, and we were able to do the entire demonstration in one sitting.

It was a rare opportunity to gain insight into how Carla creates her art. At times she attacks the painting with reckless abandon and every mark is subject to modification or even obliteration as the painting progresses. Her paintings seem to be the result of a continuous dialog between the artist and her art... she makes marks and the painting responds. To Carla, a predetermined



end result would eliminate the joy of the process.

PET PORTRAITS – A PROCESS

During the pandemic, I have been kept busy painting pet portraits for neighbors and friends. Like most endeavors, this started by accident to commemorate a neighbor's beautiful Springer Spaniel, Mica.



But how was I to achieve true likeness? I created a repeatable process. The following will produce a very accurate and lifelike watercolor. People comment on the captured expressions. Frankly, I wasn't paying attention to that. It will simply emerge.

- Photograph the animal with lots of candid pictures.
 (No such thing as too many). Ask the owner to play with the animal while photographing.
- 2. Transfer the ones you like to your computer.
- 3. Edit the chosen photograph and crop, converting to black and white; adjust for strongest contrast. Print on typing paper.
- 4. Use a light box, tracing features and shadows onto another sheet. This outline becomes your template. It may seem confusing at first but will become selfevident when you begin painting.

- 5. To manage the size of the finished portrait, use a projector to transfer the drawing to watercolor paper.
- 6. Print a good colored original on photo paper. This is your guide; follow it as scrupulously as possible.
- 7. Paint by numbers. Simply fill in the colored areas as they appear in the photo. Soften some edges.
- 8. The eyes are the key! Strong contrast and highlights are critical. Add as many as you need. I use white pastel chalk to drop them in.



Hint: About halfway through, photograph and transfer it to the computer to see where it needs more contrast or color. I discovered with "Mikey" I liked it as is, unfinished. He appears to emerge from the paper. Very artsy.

When asked what I charge for pet portraits, my "answer" is \$500 for a

quarter sheet and \$1,000 for a half sheet. The truth is that I have never charged anyone a dime. It has become my ministry. When I present the finished work to someone who has recently lost a beloved companion and they burst into tears, I have received all the payment I require.
